Last Tuesday Year 5 and 6 were visited by the local Youth Liaison Offers from Merrylands Police Station. THE ANNUNCIATION AND THE ANGELUS

The feast of the Annunciation of the Lord celebrates the angel Gabriel's appearance to the

Virgin Mary Luke 1:26-38, his announcement that the Blessed Virgin had been chosen to be the Mother of Our Lord, and Mary's willing acceptance of God's holy plan. This 'yes' to trusting God and his plan is also a 'yes' to our salvation.



The Angelus is an ancient pray-

er celebrating the Angel Gabriel's annunciation of the Lord to the Blessed Virgin Mary. It is recited at 6am, noon, and 6pm and the time for recitation was traditionally marked by the ringing of church bells (which were known as the Angelus bells).

Former Bishop of our diocese, Archbishop Anthony Fisher OP mandated that, as of 2013, staff and students of each Catholic systemic school stop in the middle of each school day, preferably at noon, to pray the Angelus. The Angelus is a beautiful tradition of prayer that punctuates the working day with a time to recall and reflect on the gift of God's Son.



It is a deliberate interruption to the day to remind us of God's love for us and to stop in prayer to help our unity with God to grow stronger. The Angelus will only take a couple of

minutes to pray, but is an important reminder that there is more to life, much more, than the toil of everyday routines. During the Angelus the staff and students at St Patrick's will be able to remind themselves to live by Mary's example and accept God's will, to thank the Lord and humble themselves to his service.
